

PFAS Action: Governments, Retailers, and Brands are Stepping Up

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State as well as federal, tribal, and local governments, retailers and brands are taking action to address the PFAS crisis. PFAS contamination is widespread and will cost taxpayers billions to clean up. More action must be taken now to prevent harm and end the use of these toxic “forever” chemicals that impact our health. **Maine and Minnesota have adopted policy to ban all uses of PFAS** unless the use is necessary for public health. In 2022, the major chemical manufacturer **3M announced that it will stop manufacturing all PFAS by the end of 2025**. In 2023, the European Chemical Agency unveiled a sweeping proposal for banning the use of PFAS across the EU. Highlights of growing momentum in food packaging, water, firefighting foam, textiles, and litigation include:



Food Packaging
